## **Natural Edge Bowls**

Please read sections at end of newsletter re bringing pieces of your work for the Daventry Show & the change of date for May's meeting.

First, a joke for the grandchildren – punchline at the end of the newsletter.

"What do you call a rooster looking at a lettuce?"

Our newly elected Chair Nick Milton kicked off the year with a demonstration of how to turn a natural edge bowl. Often misdescribed as 'live edge', a natural edge piece is one where the turner retains some of the tree's bark in the final design, the outer layers of which are dead rather than 'live'.



As you will read later on, the bark can come loose & fly off a turning piece. Please ensure you are using adequate PPE to protect your face & eyes when turning a natural edge. Also consider standing to the side of the firing line.

Nick began by preparing his piece of Pear wood for the lathe. The bark makes mounting the piece more of a challenge than normal so a few tips to ensure a safe & secure connection when using the following:

#### 1. Screw chuck.

You need to ensure that the hole for the screw chuck is the right size. Measure the core (not the thread) of the screw with callipers to select the correct drill bit.

Using a flat bit or similar to remove the bark where the screw will meet the wood to help provide a stable connection, see image below. Ensure the hole is drilled deep enough for the screw otherwise it will bottom out, stripping the thread on the wood & making a poor connection. Use a little wax on the screw to help.





#### 2. Face plate or Glue chuck

As with the screw chuck, remove enough bark so that the face plate can be screwed securely on to solid wood. Follow the same procedure with a glue chuck so that the glue has a solid base to adhere to.

Mount the piece on to the lathe & use the tail stock for safety & balance. Double check your face & eye protection.

Get the piece turning & create a spigot – a small debate ensued regarding preferences for male or female...but each to their own...create a dovetail to fit the chuck.





Make the base slightly concave so that it will sit nicely when finished.

Due to the grain orientation of the piece that will end up as a bowl, begin roughing the with a Bowl gouge – not a "Spindle" Roughing gouge, it's not a spindle!

Finish the outside to the desired shape.

A great tip at this point is to use a piece of pipe lagging to hold the abrasive to keep your fingers away from the heat caused by friction. There can be a fair bit of 'sanding' & sudden heat in the abrasive hurts! Continue through the grits interspersed with coats of sanding sealer, denibbed & next grit.





Final finish should be Danish Oil rather than wax which will become encrusted within the rough bark areas.

Please read safety instructions regarding cloths used for Danish Oil. They must be dried & stored or disposed of correctly to avoid spontaneous combustion & risk of fire spreading - be cautious.

Mount the spigot in to the chuck & begin to hollow. You could use a forstner bit initially to take out the bulk & speed up the process. Check depth & mark accordingly – remembering to hold the chuck when withdrawing the forstner bit to ensure it remains firmly in the tail stock.





Design the piece as required but consider leaving a wider rim to show off the bark – the natural edge – & undercut to reduce the thickness of the bowl.

We had a quick discussion re the stability of bark on different woods. It was advised that the bark of Cherry & Beech can be liable to ping off more as the wood seasons. Acacia & Ash bark generally stays on.

If the bark begins to come off as it is turned, you can use sanding sealer or

CA glue to help stabilise it & secure any loose sections.
